
JERICHO CUP - WARRNAMBOOL - NOVEMBER 2018
SOUTH AUSTRALIAN SEASON WRAP-UP CHAMPIONS















As the 2018 jumps season in South Australia comes to a close, there were a number of highlights and landmarks for SA-trained horses and the state's major jumping races that are worth looking at again.

The Von Doussa Steeplechase at Oakbank was for the first time in living memory run outside of the Easter Racing Carnival, a decision that certainly impacted on the quality of the field, with 10 of the best chasers in Australia lining up at the iconic Adelaide Hills track. Seasoned observers remarked that this was the best field for many years and the race itself didn't disappoint, with Patrick Payne's Zed Em (ridden by Steven Pateman) finishing strongly to win by 3 lengths.

The NZ-bred chaser then backed up to win the Great Eastern Steeplechase thirteen days later at the Easter Carnival (again with Pateman aboard), becoming the first horse since fellow Kiwi Toubouggie Nights in 2012 to win both the Von Doussa and the Great Eastern in the same year.

Another highlight of the 2018 season was undoubtedly Grant Young's Tunes, who won the Over The Rainbow series with 42 points, just ahead of another reliably consistent hurdler Searaven (trained by Barry Brook) on 35 points. With three wins across the season, including a hugely popular victory in the Irish Hurdle at Morphettville on the last day of the jumps year, Tunes has shown himself to be one

of the most versatile and durable horses in Australia, and his confident front-running jumping saw the 10-year-old also pick up two second places in what was a stellar season.

Grant Young further established his credentials as one of the best jumping trainers in Australia through the performances of his iron horse Spying On You. Named the Most Consistently Performed Horse at the AJRA Mosstrooper Awards in 2016 and winner of the Great Eastern Steeplechase in 2017, the 9-year-old started the 2018 season with a win over hurdles at Gawler in February, then ran 4th in the Great Eastern, 3rd in the Grand Annual, and was well in contention in the Australian Steeplechase when brought down with two to go. To cap off another remarkable year, Spying On You was only beaten in the last stride by Sea King in the Grand National Steeplechase at Ballarat in August in what was one of the most thrilling jumping races of the year.

Had Spying On You been able to hold on, it would have been a unique double for SA-trained chasers at the meeting, after Barry Brook's Caroun with Shane Jackson aboard took out the BM120 Steeplechase earlier in the day. Other highlights of 2018 included a maiden hurdle win for Exalted Kanga (another from the Grant Young stable), jumps racing returning to Naracoorte for the first time in many years, two hurdle races at Gawler featuring all SA-trained fields, and a 3rd place



To round off the season, at the TRSA Racing Industry Awards at the beginning of September, Martin Kelly won the EJ Mooney Medal for the 2018 South Australian Jumps Jockey of the Year after taking out the Over The Rainbow series with 46 points, while the 2018 SA Jumps Trainer of the Year went to Eric Musgrove, who picked up 97 points in the series.

SA-TRAINED JUMPING HORSES IN 2018

The 2018 jumps racing season in South Australia has been a year of consolidation, rather than great strides being made either forward or backwards.

There were 20 jumps races in South Australia in 2018 (13 hurdles and 7 steeplechases), with the average field size down a little at 6.5 (6.5 in hurdles, 6.4 in chases), as opposed to 7.2 in 2017. The overall percentage of SA-trained jumpers in 2018 dropped slightly to 40.8% (44.4% in 2017).

SA-trained horses were most prominent in hurdle races with 51.8% of all starters, which was down on the figure

of 54.2% in 2017; the local representation in steeplechases was down in 2018 at 20%, as opposed to 25% last year. SA-trained horses won 46.2% of all the hurdle races held in South Australia in 2018, came 2nd in 53.8% and took 3rd place in 61.5% of hurdles, while two hurdle races in 2018 featured all SA-trained fields. There were no SA-trained steeplechase winners in 2018, after local horses won 2 chases last year.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2019

South Australian Jumps Racing (SAJR) will be aiming to support the growth in the number of SA-owned and -trained jumping horses competing in 2019. As part of this mission, SAJR will be introducing a platform that will make it easier for current and potential owners to find suitable jumping horses, and for new entrants to the industry to get connected to a SA jumps trainer.

Warrnambool to host Jericho Cup

A \$300,000 HORSE RACE OVER A GRUELLING 4600 METRES WILL BE RUN AT WARRNAMBOOL TO COMMEMORATE AUSTRALIA AND NEW ZEALAND'S INVOLVEMENT IN WORLD WAR I AND AS A TRIBUTE TO ALL ANZAC HORSES LOST AT WAR.

The Warrnambool Racing Club is set to host the inaugural \$300,000 Haymes Paint Jericho Cup on Sunday 2nd December in honour of the heroic servicemen and their magnificent mounts, The Walers, for their heroic deeds in the Middle East from 1915–1919. This special race day commemorates the 100 year anniversary of The Jericho Cup and will be run as a 4,600m flat race across the Brierly Paddock.

The distance of the Warrnambool race is the same as that of the original race in Palestine, just outside the city of Jericho, in 1918.

The 2018 event is the brainchild of Victorian philanthropist Bill Gibbins. Gibbins is sponsoring the race through the WRC.

"Australia has a proud war history and any event that positively promotes the involvement of the ANZAC soldiers and their horses during battle - we are only too happy to support," WRC chief executive Peter Downs said.

The race day looks forward to welcoming Return Veterans and their families and friends and will feature historic displays and free children's activities. A large memorabilia tent showcasing treasured items from the Australian Light Horse and Battle of Beersheba during the first World War. The club is inviting anyone that has items they would like to display and share with patrons on the day to contact the club.

Free entry is offered to DVA Gold Card Holders and children (under 18 years), with free car parking available in Albert Park Reserve. There are a number of different hospitality options available to both Warrnambool Racing Club members and the public, with a dedicated Return Veteran's Marquee offering an all-inclusive 3-course luncheon for DVA Gold Card Holders and their guests.

In partnership with the Victorian State Government, Country Racing Victoria and RSL Victorian Branch, the club is selling commemorative Jericho Cup pins, with all proceeds donated to the RSL Victoria Branch with the aim to raise \$15,000 through this initiative. Businesses and individuals are welcome to purchase a box to sell or purchase individual pins in support of this fundraising event. The boxes are \$150 each and include 10 x Gold Pins (\$10 each) and 10 x Silver Pins (\$5 each) and details of where to purchase pins are available on the club's website.

At 4600m the \$300,000 Cup will be the longest flat race in Australasia and then some (the Melbourne Cup is 3200m)—
a tribute to a "three mile" race that "Banjo" Paterson and other Light Horse officers staged in Palestine to boost morale. And, perhaps, to lull the enemy into a false sense of security before launching an attack. A race meeting, deliberately promoted so the Turks would hear about it, was a way to explain a massed gathering of soldiers and horses. In the "factionalised" version, Bill the Bastard wins the "three-miler" across the sand, ridden by an Aboriginal jockey. As history, that bit is up there with The Man from Snowy River and Braveheart.

The real worth of Bill the Bastard was not how fast he was, but how tough.

Descriptions suggest he was a big, rough chestnut gelding of uncertain breeding and temperament. Like thousands of others sold to the army by outback stations, he had probably run wild early in his life — then proved too hard to break in.

After being sent to the Middle East with shiploads of other "remounts", Bill proved an incurable buckjumper — hence the nickname. He was mostly used as a packhorse until a Queenslander, Major Michael Shanahan, managed to ride him, which was lucky for the four soldiers that Shanahan and Bill the Bastard rescued at the battle for Romani on August 4, 1916.

The story goes that Shanahan rode up and down the line under fire to rally the troops. Bill endured this for several hours longer than other officers' chargers.

According to one account: "Shanahan and Bill found four Tasmanian soldiers stranded next to their dead horses and under gun fire. Shanahan said to them, 'Get up on Bill, get up! One on each stirrup, two on the back, we will get out'." The rogue horse, unrideable not long before, carried the five men (a load of maybe 380kg) to safety.

Sadly, Shanahan was shot later in the battle and would lose a leg. The amputation got him a trip to England, then home to Queensland, the DSO bravery medal, and the war story of a lifetime.
